President's Report

Philip Hedley, President 2022-23

Firstly, I would like to thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as your President. It's been a fulfilling year. I have reflected on my thoughts as outlined at last year's changeover.

One thing I enjoy most about this Club is the Fellowship. We all actually enjoy spending time with each other and engaging at our face-to-face meetings. So much so that we increased from two per month to three.

We also enjoy the camaraderie of the monthly Rye Market and Pat's Sausage Sizzle.

These two activities not only add to our fund raising but provide us with the opportunity to fly the Rotary Club flag in the community and build our presence.

Our camaraderie was also increased this year, when we acted as host club for the District 9820 Conference held at RACV Cape Schanck Resort in February. The Organising Committee was predominantly members of this Club and ensured the Conference was a great success. I know Paul was very proud of the commitment Club Members gave to achieve this. It was certainly one of the highlights of the year.

Our programme this year has introduced many and varied speakers from even across the world, as we learned more about local, national and international organisations and their projects.

Our ongoing fundraising efforts have enabled us to donate over \$120,000 this Rotary Year. This is an amazing total for such a small Club.

Our club has a strong commitment to Youth Programmes and this commitment continued this year.


We provided \$50,000 to start up the BEAM Mentoring Programme at Rosebud Secondary College in 2023. This programme aims to help young students build their confidence, self-esteem and to shine from within. There are ongoing discussions with the school to continue funding for 2024 and beyond.

Other funding grants this year went to Eastbourne Primary School for a Wellness Hub and Music Scholarships; our annual Student Awards at five local Primary Schools; Hardship Scholarships for students at Rosebud Secondary College; sending three participants to the National Youth Science Forum and sponsoring two students and a facilitator to the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards camp in July 2023.

We continue to support the Young Change Agents programme and I would especially like to thank Libby Wilson for her strong commitment to this programme.

The Peninsula Trail has been strongly promoted, not only by Mornington Peninsula Shire, but also Ross Kilburn on behalf of the Rotary Clubs on the Peninsula. The Club agreed to share the \$70,000 cost, together with the Capel Sound Foreshores Committee, of building a BBQ Shelter which is found along the Trail.

This sign-posted community resource BBQ was officially



opened in May and will provide a weather-proof facility, not only for the campers during the holiday season but also the local community year-round and those using the trail and wishing to stop for some R & R.

Other Community Club funding has been provided to support the Peninsula Film Festival, provide a defibrillator for Gippsland Rotary Centenary House in Traralgon and fund childcare equipment at Rye Community House.

Whilst the vast majority of our funds have been spent locally, we have also contributed to those communities abroad that are in need of support.

These include the rebuild of the Dreketi school in Fiji: Turkey / Syria earthquake victims; part support for an Interplast team to the Asia Pacific region; a Teachers' Aid in Cambodia and the supply of kitchen equipment for a mental hospital in Nepal.

The club also donated to Rotary Programmes - End Polio Now, The Rotary Foundation and Australian Rotary Health.

What sets us apart from other Clubs is the ongoing functioning of the Warehouse and Op Shop. From its humble beginnings, the tireless efforts of Libby have further developed our Enterprise into a source of treasures which can be sold to informed parties, while maintaining our ability to provide a workplace for those improving their business skills, offering donations to the most needy or well-priced goods to local buyers and a significant ongoing income stream for the Club. We are very fortunate to be in this position. Thanks to Libby and her team of volunteers and members at the Warehouse and Op shop.

Non-funding opportunities also come up from time to time and the Club likes nothing more than flying the Rotary flag loud and proud. Community support has gone to providing New Year's Eve Dinner for emergency services staff; thanks to Club members Barry I, Bernard and Darren; and

the Sthn Pen Amateur Radio Show at Eastbourne PS, and RocknRods Festival, thanks to Darren.

The Club engaged in some serious contemplation on the challenges of Membership which were facing us as a Club. I would like to thank Claire for the work she did on speaking to the Club about Membership and the 'Why'. Let's hope that brings results next year.

Next, I would like to thank my Board for their support and commitment this year. Firstly, my Senior Executive: Secretary Heather - always providing the Board with documentation for our meetings, keeping members informed about District and Club events and ensuring I was across any issues as they arose. Treasurer Libby - thanks for taking on the role again during my year. I have enjoyed our "tongue in cheek" discussions on whether the project should be funded by Inc or Ent and our many other conversations during the year. Thanks for keeping me up to date with local happenings.

Secondly, the other Club Directors: International Sandra, Youth Jo and Libby, Membership and Vocational Claire, Technology Bernard, Environment Gordon, Community Marilyn. During the year Lorraine ensured we were fed and watered at our face-to-face meetings. Thank you. And last, but not least Gael - thank you for acting as Bulletin Editor and for being there as a constant support to me during the year.

Finally I was reading the June edition of Rotary Downunder, which included the final message from RI President Jennifer Jones, titled "Not Goodbye, but Good work". I really liked her sentiment and have adapted her last paragraph, which reflects my thoughts on the year. Overview

Full year trading for the Rotary Club of Rosebud-Rye's three fundraising businesses - the Op Shop, Sausage Sizzle and Market, resulted in an improvement in financial results for 2022-2023.



Total Expenses: \$162,000 (includes \$47,000 depreciation)

Operating Profit: \$61,000 **Donations**: \$35,000

Net profit (surplus) for 2022-2023 was \$27,000

At 30th June 2023, the total Net Assets (Equity)- of the Club were \$1,387,025 against \$1,367,893 at 30th June 2023




Investing in our young people has continued to be a major focus area over the past year. Some of the activities are:

Young Change Agents (YCA) - the Club's partnership with YCA continued, providing mentoring through programs with students aged 12-18 at local schools: students identify a problem, and using entrepreneurial skills, plan opportunities and solutions.

BEAM@RSC - <u>Brings Engagement and Meaning</u> - the Club-funded mentoring program, launched in Term 1 2023 at Rosebud SC got off to a strong start and continues to provide supportive relationships for students.





Santos Science Experience - again encouraging science, the Club sponsored 20 Rosebud SC students to participate

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) - two Rosebud SC students, allocated to represent Myanmar, attended the day, ably cheered on by a number of Club members (pictured below)

Hardship Scholarships (2) - for Rosebud SC students experiencing disadvantage for school uniforms and other necessary educational equipment

Music Scholarships - enabling Eastbourne PS students to learn clarinet and flute.

Student Awards - students from Eastbourne, Rosebud, Rye, Tootgarook and Boneo PS, and Rosebud SC were the beneficiaries of end of year Awards which help to fund their transition to either secondary or tertiary education.

The Rotary Club of Rosebud-Rye, working in partnership with the Capel Sound Foreshores Committee of Management, created history when, through this community-focused partnership, the new and much-needed new BBQ Shelter was officially opened on Friday afternoon 12th May 2023, celebrated with a frree community sausage sizzle. Located on the foreshore opposite Carmichael Street, Capel Sound, it is well placed for local community members, visitors and those living rough to access.

This project marks another milestone in the Peninsula Trail project. This unique \$50 million project, led by Mornington Peninsula Shire Council and supported by eight Rotary Clubs across the Mornington Peninsula, responds to a 2021 survey which identified better walking and cycling infrastructure as a community priority. It was endorsed by local Rotary Clubs to mark the 100th Anniversary of Rotary in Australia.

The project includes the development of 100 kms of trails, walking and bike riding infratructure for local communities

When I was asked if I would consider becoming the International Director of our Club, I felt honoured. I immediately jumped at the opportunity to learn more about the inner workings of Rotary. Having worked in Nepal for over 10 years, I know full well how far aid dollars go towards making a huge difference in peoples' lives - and being at the forefront through Rotary was an exciting prospect.



However, at my first board meeting, I realised that I was completely out of my depth and decided to spend time 'watching and learning'. I am very grateful that Heather and Mandy invested much time and energy in creating an 'owners manual' for new Board Members. I seriously enjoy the lively board meetings and recommend all club members put up their hands for these roles.





Education is the key to ending poverty everywhere and even more so in the schools we supported - Dreketi school in Fiji through the RC of Beaumaris and Australian Rotarians living in Fiji; and Ptea Teuk Dong School in Battambang, Cambodia which was the focus of our illustrious former president, Brian Allen OAM.



Finally, after many months, I decided to take my training wheels off and suggested a project in Nepal. Through my time there, and attending many local Rotary meetings, I met Kamala from KOSHISH, an Emergency Mental Health organisation, and I was moved by her personal story. KOSHISH had just completed building their new centre and they needed kitchen equipment. I was thrilled that the club was willing to support this worthwhile organisation. This has led to District grant application which was accepted ... and now the challenging work of gaining support from other Penninsula clubs to create a sustainable food production project has begun.

And, finally, we are well on the way to creating a powerful partnership with The Fred Hollows Foundation in Nepal and supporting them in ending avoidable blindness ... by creating a Kid's Activity Book called 'LOVE YOUR EYES".

And of course, forever in the background we can all be proud of our ongoing support of RAM (Rotarians Against Malaria) and Polio Plus, the foundation of our work in the world.

I am looking forward to the year ahead ... so watch this space!
